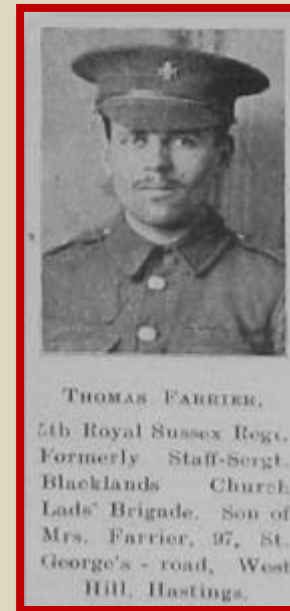

Sussex County Association of Change Ringers in the Great War

The roll published on pages 54-56* of the Sussex County Association of Change Ringers (SCACR), 1914/15 Report/Handbook, records 62 *'Members Serving with the Colours'* from 20 towers*. [See scanned copies of the roll below in section 1]

It's interesting to note that at this stage of the war the Christ Church Tower at Blacklands (Hastings) already had eleven of its members serving, this must have severely curtailed their bell-ringing activities! I expect the majority of these would have also been members of the Blacklands Church Lads' Brigade and/ or the Territorial Force.

Underneath this roll the then SCACR Hon. Sec. (1908-17) George Watson, reported that: *"One of the above – J. Livermore, Jun. – a ringer of great ability, and well known in Sussex, has died from wounds received whilst engaged in ambulance work in Flanders"*. James William Livermore, a ringer at Christ Church, Blacklands, had died of wounds on 30th May 1915 while serving with the 2nd (West Riding) Field Ambulance, Army Service Corps. Not reported at the time but 13 days previous to the loss of James Livermore, another Christ Church, Blacklands ringer, Thomas Frederick Farrier had given his life.



Thomas was serving with the 1st/5th (Cinque Ports) Battalion, Territorial Force of The Royal Sussex Regiment. On the 9th May at the Battle of Aubers Ridge the Battalion had suffered over 200 casualties and on the 12th they had moved into the large Bethune Tobacco Factory to rest and recoup. Unfortunately on the 17th a German shell scored a direct hit on the guard room and killed or wounded all its occupants, except the prisoner under their guard! Thomas was one of those killed. Before the war he had been a Staff Sergeant of the Blacklands Church Lads' Brigade. Thomas Frederick Farrier is the first known SCACR casualty to lose his life in the war.

No further rolls were published in the annual SCACR Report/Handbooks' until 1918/1919 when two further rolls appeared. One records ***'Those who had served or were still serving in the war'**** as 147 members from 30 Towers. The other: ***'Those who had fallen in the war'**** as 30 members from 14 Towers. *[See scanned copies of the both rolls below in section 1]

In early 1920 the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers (CCCBR) requested that all Associations, Guilds & Societies send in the names of their fallen so they could be inscribed into the proposed *'Central Council Memorial Book of Church Bell-Ringers who fell in the Great War 1914-1918'*. The names received were inscribed and the book was presented to the Council at its 1924 meeting. The SCACR had sent in the names taken from the roll of ***'Those who fallen in the war'*** as published in 1919 with no additions of amendments.

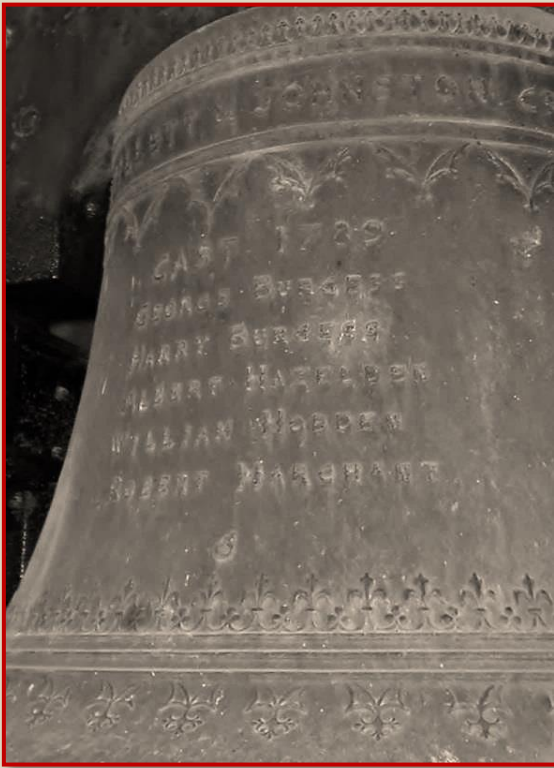
The Librarian laid before the Council the completed Roll of Honour of ringers who fell in the war. The work was executed by Mr. Cousins, of Cambridge, and is a most beautifully illuminated volume containing 1,071 names. Bound in royal blue leather it has been described by an authority at the British Museum as one of the finest pieces of modern illumination ever shown. With the consent of the Dean it is to be placed in the library of St. Paul's Cathedral.

The SCACR, unlike some other Ringing Associations and Societies, doesn't have its own Great War Roll of Honour and/or Memorial Roll on display in a Sussex Church or Public Building. In 1921 John Thornton Rickman (SCACR Master 1920-1935), proposed that there should be: "A memorial in a Sussex town somewhere to those members who fell in the war and although this was discussed no decision was reached, and the matter was left to stand over at present. The idea of an Association memorial was never pursued in any further'." [See SCACR 1885-2010 by David Kirkcaldy, p.61/62] I hope this online roll goes some way to put right that oversight.

WESTHAM BELLS.
RECAST PEAL DEDICATED.

Sussex ringers from Eastbourne, Brighton, Hastings, and other centres, attended the dedication of the recast ring of six bells at St. Mary's Church, Westham, on Saturday, May 14th. The bells were originally a ring of six with the tenor 8½ cwt. Four of them were badly cracked, and were held together by means of iron straps. All have been recast by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon, into a new ring of six with the tenor 10½ cwt. in G, with all new fittings added, and are hung in a new steel frame, and provided with new rope guides.

A special form of service was used at the dedication, which was conducted by the Venerable Archdeacon A. W. Upcott, Archdeacon of Hastings, assisted by the Rev. C. E. Lucas, the Vicar of Westham. Immediately after the dedication a few rounds were rung on the bells by local men, who are just learning to ring, under the direction of Mr. Penfold, of Pevensey, and subsequently a touch of Bob Minor was rung by the following: A. Gower 1, J. Sharp 2, A. C. Pankhurst 3, G. A. Howse 4, G. Penfold 5, B. Hobbs 6. Various touches were afterwards rung of Kent and Oxford Treble Bob, and other methods.

The churchwardens very generously provided a tea at the Railway Hotel for all ringers present, numbering about 30, and a vote of thanks and of congratulation to them and to the founders was passed, and duly responded to by Mr. Roods, one of the churchwardens, and by Mr. C. Dean on behalf of the bell founders.

On each of the bells is the inscription: 'Cast 1789. Recast by Gillett and Johnston, Croydon, 1921.' In addition the tenor bears the following names of local ringers who lost their lives in the war: George Burgess, Harry Burgess, Albert Hazelden, William Hobden Robert Marchant.

In 1921, the then six (1789) bells at St. Mary the Virgin, Westham were removed and re-cast. This work had been long overdue and apparently was carried out in lieu to any other memorial to the fallen of that village. [See SCACR 1885-2010 by David Kirkcaldy, p.61/62] The bells were hung with all new fittings in a new steel frame with new rope guides. In addition the tenor bell was inscribed with five names*, and although the inscription doesn't state it, they were in fact all Westham bell-ringers who had lost their lives in the Great War: George Burgess, Harry Burgess, Albert Hazelden, William Hobden and Robert Marchant. Due to the research carried out by several SCACR members & others countrywide, a further 29 names 'of the Sussex fallen in the war' have now been traced. 18 of these have been added to the CCCBR's Great War Memorial volumes raising the original Sussex total of 30 names to 48. At present February 2019, there's another eleven Sussex ringers names pending addition. If and when these names are agreed and added it will raise the Sussex ringers' commemorated total in the now two volumes of CCCBR, *Memorial Book of Church Bell Ringers who fell in the Great War 1914-1918* to 59.

During the war and early 1920's one of the main reasons why the names of Sussex Bell-ringers who fell were often missed was due to Sussex towers not being affiliated to the SCACR and/or CCCBR. An example of this taken from the SCACR 1914/1915 Report/Handbook, out of a possible 120 Churches with a peal of 5 to 10 bells, only 51 bands were affiliated. [See scanned copy below] By 1918/1919 Report/Handbook this had dropped to 41! My view on this is that all Sussex Bell-ringers regardless if their Tower was or wasn't affiliated should qualify for commemoration on both the SCACR & CCCBR Memorial Rolls.

In the SCACR Great War Roll of Honour pdf file, I've provided the basic service details for those all those known Sussex Ringers who fell including 'How, Where and When They Died' and also where they are Buried or Commemorated. For me this is a 'labour of love' and a long term project and my plan is also to provide a biography on each of the 'fallen' names and where possible a photograph. For the past year I've been collating a roll of all those Sussex ringers who were known to have '*served*' in the war, of which many returned, and this roll that first included with the November 1918 update has also been updated.

I've made every attempt to ensure that the information provided in the SCACR Great War Memorial & Roll of Honour 'pdf' file is accurate, but mistakes can and do happen. REPORT FOR 1914.

It is hard to write a brief summary of the Association's work during the past year without continually dwelling upon the war, begun in the Autumn, and now being waged with such deadly intent. One effect to the members has been to curtail ringing efforts, and almost entirely to prohibit peal-ringing, whilst another has been to decrease the number of subscriptions to a small extent. Notwithstanding this however, our financial position continues to remain in a highly satisfactory condition—a profit of rather more than ten pounds having been made on the year's working.

The Benevolent Fund—though still in its infancy—is proving its utility, grants of two guineas each having been made in the early part of the year to three members greatly needing help. As several of our members are now serving with the colours, and some of these may lose life or limb in defence of their country, larger calls may be made upon this fund in the immediate future, and, if so, they will be met with the most sympathetic treatment by those called upon to administer it.

To those ringers who have temporarily discarded the *rope* for the *rifle*, the hearty congratulations of the Committee are gladly accorded.

Seven district meetings have been held, and fifty-four peals rung, during the year.

The Challenge bell has been won by the Heene Band with 250.775 points, St. Peter's, Brighton, band—the first on the list last year, and on many previous occasions—occupying this time the second place.

Mr. Gravett has again kindly acted as peals' secretary, and has most ably carried out the duties connected with his office.

But little in the way of bell repairs has been done this year, the only notable work being that the Goring bells (6) have been re-hung in a new iron frame—one of the six having been re-cast—by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank.

REPORT FOR 1915.

Notwithstanding the war, the financial position of the Association continues to improve, for although—as might have been expected—the income this year has not been so great as in former years, the expenses, owing to the small number of meetings, have also been considerably less; the net result being that our assets have been augmented during the year by about thirteen pounds.

As will be seen by a reference to the Balance Sheet, we have purchased out of the current and Benevolent Accounts £50 of the 4½ per cent War Loan. A proposal will be made at the Annual Meeting to make this the Reserve Fund of the Association, and it will also be proposed at that meeting to withdraw the present Reserve Fund from the Post Office Savings Bank, leaving the Committee to invest the whole, or such portion as may be deemed advisable in their opinion, in Exchequer Bonds.

It cannot but be gratifying to the members to know that our finances are in such a happy state that should bad times arise in the future, we shall in all probability be able to cope with them.

As has already been said, but few meetings (four in all) have been held, but it is earnestly hoped that a greater number may be held in the coming year, and although it has not been found possible to arrange times and places for these, the District Secretaries will be most pleased to welcome invitations from any towers desirous of having meetings. Though “the times be out of joint” and many restrictions have been placed upon ringing, members are earnestly requested to do all in their power to keep the work of the Association to the fore, and as the song says—

“Keep the Church-bells ringing
Till the boys come home.”

Only six peals, and all of these either five or six bell peals, have been rung during the past year, the Shipley band being the only one to get into double figures in the points list.

Before concluding this brief report, we would convey our heartiest greetings and best of good wishes to those of our members now serving with His Majesty's Forces.

REPORT FOR 1917.

In placing before you a review of the work of the Association during the past year, it is very gratifying to find by the Balance Sheet the Association still paying its way. We are now in the fourth year of the war, and, despite the many calls made upon its membership, the bells of the County are—generally speaking—still being rung for service.

Twelve months ago it was thought by some that the work of the Association should be allowed to stand still until after the war, but this was unanimously over-ruled by the members and the work is now successfully going on as usual. It should certainly be a much easier task to keep the present Association alive than to create a new one after the war, for if once ringers are allowed to drift apart it is very difficult to get them together again. The Association, therefore, make an urgent appeal to its members to do all in their power to keep their foundations firm, and to secure all they possibly can in the way of young members to fill up the gaps caused in their ranks by the war.

Divisional Meetings have been held at Brighton (St. Peter's), Uckfield (Central); Mayfield, Salehurst (Eastern); Heene, Steyning, and Horsham (Western); which were generally successful and well attended. In each case the Association has been in a position to give half railway fare to those attending, and in the majority of cases the clergy provided refreshment, for which we tender them our sincere thanks.

Subscriptions were received from only 9 Hon. Members, 1 Active Life Member, and 12 Annual Members.

One Peal only was rung during the year, it being generally understood that Peal Ringing should not take place during the war, only on very special occasions.

Two peals rung in 1916 are recorded this year.

The Benevolent Fund has once more proved useful, a grant of £2 2s. being made to a member in difficulty through illness.

REPORT FOR 1918.

We much regret to record the death of our late General Hon. Sec., Mr. Watson, of St. Leonards. He gave his best to the Association, and credit is justly due to him for the sound position the Sussex Association now holds. We all deeply sympathise with his relatives in their bereavement.

We welcome our new Hon. Treasurer, Ellman Brown, Esq., who kindly consented to hold that office after the Annual Meeting.

We earnestly ask members to do all in their power to further the work of the Association in their towers and elsewhere, and hope, during the coming year of Peace, good progress will be made.

We wish to express our great pleasure at seeing many of our absent brother ringers returning home, and desire to extend to them a cordial and hearty welcome.

The Challenge Bell has been won by the Salehurst Branch, to whom we tender congratulations.

The Association has lost one of its oldest members by the death of Mr. H. Evans, who for fourteen years held the office of Hon. Secretary of the Western Division. Our sympathy is extended to his daughter and son in their sad loss.

In conclusion, it is hoped that the membership of the Association will continue to increase by more Towers becoming affiliated, and that every member will use his best endeavours to help advance the interests and work of the Association generally.

One of the above—J. Livermore, jun.—a ringer of great ability, and well known in Sussex, has died from wounds received whilst engaged in ambulance work in Flanders. The ready sympathy of all the members of the Association will be felt for his parents and other relatives. The tower of Christ Church, Blacklands, Hastings, has, by his death, suffered a very great loss.
