Scratchings from the Secretary – *Jack Burton*

Life in the ringing world seems to be settling down again after all the activities of the past year with the Jubilee and the Olympics. It is now back to routine and looking forward to next year. The first thing will be the issue of the yellow subscription forms for 2013. It will be the same routine as last year, except the forms themselves have been generated for the first time directly from the newly established database of membership. It is particularly important that all members check their details on the forms, remembering to tick the box if they would like a copy of the Annual Report and also giving thought as to whether they could receive their copies of 'Sally Forth' by email if they presently receive them by post but have an email address.

The Autumn meeting of the General Committee took place in November where a number of interesting items arose. Firstly all secretaries have been requested to report that the full details of the ringer's insurance package is now given on the SCACR website. This insurance cover is paid for as part of your subscription and covers all ringing members of the Association.

The next item from the meeting I found to be particularly of note and here I express my personal thoughts. A Further Education evening class has been held at Wisborough Green throughout this term with people coming from a very wide area, including Hampshire and Surrey. One wonders why a person would want to go to night school to learn to ring instead of just turning up at their nearest local church with bells. Apparently the answer is that many of them would be too self-conscious to approach the church 'cold'. Perhaps this is something we should all be thinking about. Do we advertise our need for recruits in a way that encourages someone to get in touch at or near our churches? Just advertising in church related publications may not be sufficient, as clearly many potential ringers may not have contacts with a church or even be church goers. Notices in or around the church may not be sufficient.

I am sure most of you will have heard or read about the work of the Ringing Foundation. There have been numerous letters in the Ringing World about the subject. The foundation seeks to regularise and certificate the training of ringing teachers. The 'teaching of teachers' is an important aspect in our work in the Division and teacher's classes are organised and run from time to time, but I do wonder if formal certification is not a hostage to fortune in the world of insurance, health and safety, and safeguarding. The Ringing Foundation is seeking to raise £25K to fund a part-time administrator and have asked associations for money. At the General Committee Meeting the item was put aside until the next meeting in March, by which time the Education Committee will have made contact and it is hoped that more information will be available. One last thought, is not ringing administration the work of 'Ringing Masters'?

Now a plea to tower correspondents, will you please check your tower's entry in the last Annual Report for accuracy and let me have, in plenty of time, any amendments necessary for the new Report?

Just a couple of items to finish; a revised version of the SCACR tower map of Sussex is on the website for all to download, and another reminder about the next Annual Divisional Meeting at Storrington on Saturday 9th February 2013. Come along and support your Division and let me have the proposal forms for new members in good time.

Finally I would like to wish you all a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

St Mary's Victorian Christmas Market – Margo Grundy

Angmering and Findon Bell Ringers' Outing – Raymond Bivand (a.k.a. RingRay)

It was an early start in the pouring rain as our group boarded the minibus in Angmering for a day out to the Isle of Thanet in Kent.

The weather got somewhat brighter en route and by the time we reached The Waterloo Tower, in Quex Park, Birchington, the sun was shining and the sky was a deep shade of blue. Here, we were able to enjoy some refreshments before setting off on foot through a rather muddy field to the tower where the ringing up of the twelve bells commenced. As there were twenty people in our party there was no shortage of ringers. As we launched into rounds and call changes, this was a very good test of our bell handling and control.

Some of the towers were not particularly easy to access. Well done, Caroline Jones in particular, for getting up that near vertical long ladder at our next venue which was All Saints in Birchington. For all those ringers who braved that ladder, it was well worth it in order to ring the eight bells there.

After that, it was back to the minibus for the short journey to Minster. Here we had lunch before getting to grips with the five rather heavy bells at St. Mary's. The treble is over 7 cwt. and the tenor some 17 cwt. but feels more like twenty! Just as well we had lunch before ringing here!

Our next stop was Chislet and a more familiar ring on six bells. We were able to ring Bob Doubles and Grandsire as well as other methods performed by the more experienced ringers in our group

Our final stop was Littlebourne where we had the choice of either ringing there or at nearby St. Andrew's at Wickhambreaux. As the latter was our original choice, we opted for that as the church was opposite the Rose Inn where we already had tables booked for dinner which was excellent and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

We had many challenges to deal with on the day! The muddy field and the 12 bells at the Waterloo Tower, the vertical ladder at All Saints, Birchington, the heavy bells of Minster and the reverse ringing circle of 6 bells at Wickhambreaux. It was a nice surprise to find out that we could ring there after all, as originally planned. Some of the clappers had to be removed for maintenance and were restored just in time for our visit.

Everyone in our group played their part in making things run smoothly and keeping to the timetable which helped make the day enjoyable and successful.

Forever Imber – Aldwick Outing – *David Hall*

The little village of Imber on Salisbury Plain was effectively cleared of its inhabitants in 1943 when the Ministry of Defence gave its occupants seven days notice to leave. There was no assistance or alternative accommodation offered as it was World War 2 and there were other priorities for the authorities. The little church of St Giles had stood since the 13th century and is now the only complete building of the village still standing. It nestles in a little valley with its churchyard, and close by an odd collection of house shells are strung out along the area of the old village. The shells are used by the army for urban warfare exercises and one is even labelled as a mosque. Now in the care of the Churches Conservation Trust, it is possible to visit the church 3 or 4 times a year for a service and a chance to ring the peal of six, very light bells. This was the main purpose of a ringing outing that Darren Woodyer had organised for local Sussex ringers and friends from further away.

We started at Aldwick at 7.00 in the morning and three car loads were joined by others going direct and heading for the Wylye Valley of Wiltshire. Perfect sunny weather allowed us to enjoy the ride and reach our first church of St Mary's at Amesbury in good time. This is a large, well lit church dating from the 12th century and has a splendid ring of eight heavy bells (18cwt tenor) with a big comfy ringing chamber at first floor. These were the only stairs that we had to climb that day so it was nice to get them out of the way early! Slippery sallies and heavy bells made for some groans and squeals until we got used to them, but soon we were all loosened up after our journeys and rung some Cambridge on the back six, Grandsire and changes. An enjoyable ring and a good start to our day.

Heading further west, we admired the sight of Stonehenge, before reaching Wylye village where we had to admire the picture postcard perfection of the little church of St Nicholas. There were old cottages to die for, thatch, limestone, flint, The Bell Inn, yew trees and monuments, all getting cameras clicking before we went inside and found a friendly ring of six bells (8cwt tenor). Lots of doubles methods, hunting and changes were good for self-confidence and those waiting were able to admire the beautiful carved oak pulpit, tester, lectern, prayer desk and rails dating from 1628 and donated from a demolished church in Wilton. Property values in this area were obviously on the slide here as the pretty cottage opposite the church was for sale and had reduced its price from £800,000 to £600,000 and still wasn't selling!

Off again up the valley to Orcheston (the birth-place of Mick Channon the race horse trainer) and the choice of two churches, one at either end of the village. We had to split into two groups but even then there were only seven bells available in total! St Mary's was very pretty, built of local limestone and with a square pinnacled tower, but only had three bells. With a 7cwt tenor, it was listed as unringeable in Doves! That didn't stop us however, but did rather restrict our repertoire. A real struggle to ring up and to keep up, with moth-eaten sallies and a small ringing chamber (thanks Darren) we came away nursing aching fingers and backs. The parish gives its name to a variety of grass called Orcheston Long Grass or "Creeping Bent" which described us quite well after 10 minutes of struggling.

The other church of St George's was a relief and a treat of a different kind, as the locals had left us a great display of cakes and cold drinks. This ring of four bells (7cwt tenor) was so loud that changes had to be bellowed out at full blast, sending cake crumbs flying across the tower. We did however manage Bob Minimus with a struggle and changes, but ringing down was the best ring at this church, which is redundant and looked after by the Churches Conservation Trust.

Now it was time for the main event of the day and our cars followed each other to Salisbury Plain. Passing through the perimeter check point, the signs confirmed that the village was open and we took the long narrow tarmac road into the normally forbidden area. It was a remarkable experience in itself seeing the rolling hills covered with thick unfenced meadow grass, the deep valleys and thick woods and the occasional sign warning us to avoid leaving the road. It had become one vast nature reserve and was like going back 70 years in time. Soon the little pinnacles of Imber Church appeared below us in a valley and we found plenty of parking (in a little field just off of the road!). Hoping that they had cleared it of unexploded ordnances, we settled down to eat our picnic lunches and admired the view of the little limestone



church. Inside, the Churches Conservation Trust had put on a display of local photos, the history of the village and church, and refreshments. A popular event each year, some 4000 people visited in 2011, a large number of whom were ringers. The six very light bells (300lb tenor) were arranged anti-clockwise and we soon rang them up and went straight into Bob Minor, trying to look in the right direction! There then followed Bob Doubles, Plain Bob, Grandsire and changes for everybody, including others visiting, so that we could all experience this delicate ring. Over 38 ringers swelled our ranks with some coming from Harrow and even Tenterden for the chance to master these long ropes.

Getting to our next tower at Urchfont wasn't easy however, as we took a different road out, only to find it blocked at the end. Gingerly backing our cars off of the road again and waiting for the bang, we turned around and headed back, trying to avoid the potholes, until 6 miles later we were back in the real world again. St Michael and All Angels was another delightful pretty place with the village pond, old cottages, a fine 18th century house and a splendid stone church. This is also where the games show cheat Major Charles Ingram lives, but who wants to be a millionaire? The bells were not easy, being deep set and heavy (19cwt tenor) - a bit of a step up from the last tower. However, we did get some

Our final ring took us across country, past the White Horse carved in the hills, to Upavon and the church of St Mary, with it's lovely 8 sided Norman font.

Tempted by the restored cars in a local, very scruffy garage (you could buy an ivory Jaguar saloon like Inspector Morse for £28,000), we found the church and soon rang up the six bells (14 cwt tenor). We then launched into Stedman, Kent, Bob Minor and Bob Doubles. A fitting end to a fine day.

What a treat it all had been and passed too soon. The weather had been perfect, the places to visit a dream, and the ringing gave everyone a chance to experience new bells. Many thanks to Darren and the helpers and drivers for giving us such happy memories, and all of you who didn't manage to make it, come along for the next one - you don't have to be an expert, just an enthusiast!

Who rings a bell like this?

Our last newsletter had a photo sent in by June Somerville of a sally hanging about 25' in the air at the Town Church in St Peter's Port, Guernsey and asked if anyone knew a bellringer who could ring the bell.

Not content with just saying the rope is lowered through the floor, ringers from Goring and West Tarring came up with a number of other ideas: "The long arm of the law", "Guernsey police are currently looking for a 17' man with trousers just below the knee and extra long socks!!", "Where is Steve Pocock?", "Is there someone up there?", "Someone's aiming high", "We're going up to the high places", "We lost the floor" and "Little Richard with his 'Long Tall Sally', and his 'Slippin and Slidin' for when the long rope starts flying about".



Well it's that time of year again when life is very busy preparing for an extra special Christmas celebration. Hopefully by now, your list of things to buy or do has started to shrink and is becoming more manageable. One of the most time consuming but possibly the most rewarding job is writing the Christmas cards. Do you like me, start off just writing "Best Wishes from" or "Happy Christmas from" in your cards but by the end of the task find yourself writing two or three page letters to all those you haven't had time to catch up with during the year? What should be a relatively easy job becomes a marathon task.

A few years ago, we decided at Goring that we wouldn't send individual cards to all of the ringers as not only is it time consuming, it becomes quite costly with the price of cards ever increasing.
