New members to the Southern District Committee

Hi, I'm Rob! Looking back, I now realise just how long ago it was since I started to ring, 24 years ago in the winter of 1993. I was 12 years old and growing up in Seaford – my mum had seen a notice in the church magazine asking for new ringers and sent me up the spiral staircase! Under the tuition of Steve Lucas, Andrew Thompsett, and Linda Perkins I mastered the art of handling a bell and began to progress onto call changes and method ringing.

I was elected a member of the association in 1994 and in the spring of 1995 was able to go on the Hereford Ringing

Course, this was through a grant from the Reg Johnson Memorial Fund – David Beacham helped me progress onto Grandsire Doubles.

In the summer of 1995 I rang the treble to a quarter peal of Plain Bob Doubles, my first – I was chuffed. The ringers of Seaford presented me with a copy of Steve Coleman's book, The Bellinger's Bedside Companion, with details of my first quarter peal written in calligraphy inside the front cover. I've still got that book, it encouraged me on no end.

Finding my way in the world life got in the way and ringing was somewhat sporadic between 1999 and 2006. By now I was living in Worthing and started to ring regularly at West Tarring, Heene, and occasionally Goring on a practice night. It was while ringing at West Tarring that Ian Hastilow badgered me into ringing my first peal, Cambridge Minor, at West Tarring – the church where I was christened some 26 years earlier!

A move to Southwick saw me join the ringers at Shoreham-by-Sea and under the encouragement of Stephen Ward my repertoire of Surprise Major developed. Fast forward to the present day I'm now living in Findon, but commute to Tonbridge for work. These days I'm 'unattached' but have a strong allegiance to the Southern District and visit Brighton on a practice night, as well as supporting the association

at it's organised practices and events. It was a real honour to be elected to the position of Central Council Rep for the Southern District in 2017. My first meeting was up in Edinburgh for what proved to be watershed moment in the Central Council's history – a vote for change, to help align itself into a body fit to support ringing in the 21st century. This year will see a push to pass the reforms that have been worked on over the past year, and the disbandment of the old council. I am currently involved with the new Stewardship and Management group, at the moment



My name is Richard and I ring at Southover in Lewes.

I started to ring in 1973 shortly after I started secondary school when a boy on the school bus called Paul was bullying me and would not let me off the bus unless I agreed to go to bell ringing at Ripe. The late Jim Beckingham taught me to ring at Ripe.

Ripe ringing was not very advanced. Most of the ringing was rounds and call changes. Method ringing was accomplished with numbered cards placed on the ground. I decided one practice that I would also like to join in with the more

advanced ringing. I found it hard to look at the card and carry on ringing. I learnt off by heart all the numbers on the card. I later discovered that I had learnt the numbers for ringing the treble to Grandsire Doubles. I rang a quarter peal of Grandsire Doubles in 1978. I thought this was a great achievement at the time.

I got a moped when I was 16. I had heard that other methods were rung at Chiddingly. In particular they rang a method called Plain Bob Doubles. I went to Chiddingly and did quite a lot of ringing with Tim Waterman and also met a Bill Merritt and Tim Russell from Ringmer. I started to ring at Ringmer as well as Chiddingly and Ripe.

In 1982 a young Penny Clark started ringing at Ripe. We spent a lot of time out ringing. Penny Clark went to London to train as a physiotherapist. I would go and join her for Sunday ringing at Camberwell and Southwark Cathedral. Penny and I got married in 1986 we moved to Lewes and joined the Southover band of ringers.

The ringing of surprise methods was something that was beyond the capabilities of most of the ringers I rang with at this time. For many years I thought that surprise ringing was something that I would never be able to accomplish. However, this did change over time and in September 1986 Jonathan Franklin called a quarter peal of Cambridge Major at Ringmer. I had joined that exclusive group of surprise ringers.

During the 1990s I joined the Southern Division committee. At that time the Division was putting on a range of practices and I became the Education officer. I enjoyed this time and at one point at some of the practices we were learning London and Bristol Royal. During this period of time I joined the Society of Royal

Cumberland Youths. I have often wondered how this happened given that I am quite an unreliable ringer

During the early part of the century my focus was teaching and ringing with my children Tom and Lorna. Both are now adult and have continued to ring. Tom rings at Brighton. Lorna met her fiancé Ben Wigmore ringing with the Southampton University Guild. They ring at Billingshurst.

I have achieved most of my bell ringing ambitions. The one ambition that I still have is probably unattainable. This is to call a peal and in particular a peal of Stedman Caters.

I am pleased that I have been elected to the Southern District Committee. I wish to help Mary and the other committee members with the running of the Southern District. Initially I hope to visit, perhaps with Mary, some of the nearby practices and try and find out what people want from the Southern District.



2018 - Great War Centenary — Commemorative Ringing

Thank you from Alan Regin and myself, to all the Tower Bands and Ringers who during 2017 arranged and rung to Commemorate the Great War Centenary deaths of the 15 known SCACR / Sussex Ringers who died while on service in His Majesty Forces in 1917.

Also further to the 'Remembering Sussex Bell-ringers - Songs of Praise Service' held in April 2017 at St. Swithuns, East Grinstead; a special thank you to Marisa Hayes, and to all those involved in arranging and carrying out this service. Thank you also to those who attended.

1918 would see 11 known SCACR / Sussex Bell-ringers from 9 towers lose their lives. They were in date order:

Young bell ringers

Have you heard the bells ringing at Holy Trinity Church?
Ever wondered who is behind the 'ringing of the
changes? Holy Trinity has an enthusiastic and vibrant
team of bell-ringers who ring the eight bells in the tower
every week. We have ringers from ages 12-80. You may
be surprised to see how many young people or 'young
ringers' descend on the tower on Thursday evenings and
Sunday mornings. Here is an insight into the life of Young Sunday mornings. Here is an insight into the life of young ringers at Hurst.

There are about ten young ringers in our group, our ungest is Jonathan (12) and our oldest is Willia (17). We regularly ring together with the rest of the Hurstpierpoint band, but sometimes our ventures take

How did we get into ringing and why do we ring?
Before we started ringing few of us knew each other at all. William started ringing when Hurstpierpoint tower captain John Norris and past tower captain Sue Eirick visited St Lawrence school to talk about bell-ringing and invite pupils to learn to ring and take part in the three minutes of national ringing to mark the opening of the 2012 Olympic Games. William decided that he wanted to have a go and started bell-ringing lessons at Holy Trinity. He's been a dedicated member of the band ever since.

He's been a dedicated member of the band ever since. Some young ringers come from around the local area to ring at Holy Trinity on a Thursday too. Molly (15) learnt to ring at St Cosmos and St Damlan Church in Keymer but regularly goes to practice night in Hurst. This is one of the joys of ringing – in the words of young ringer Josh (16), who learnt to ring at St. John the Evangelist Church in Burgess Hill: "You can ring in so many places; ringing takes you everywhere."

takes you everywhere." We all ring for many reasons. Ringing is certainly a we air ing for many reasons, kinging is certainly a team 'sport'. It takes time to learn the different ringing patterns or 'methods' and you really have to focus to produce good ringing or 'well struck changes'. Josephine [15], who learnt to ring at 5t Margaret's Church in Ditchling, said: 'I really enjoy the complexity of methods and mental and physical challenge of ringing the bells well."

Where it all happens
At 7pm on a Thursday, ringers young and old meet to
practice our ringing at Holy Trinity. Some nights there
can be up to 20 ringers from Hurstpierpoint and the
surrounding area. John Norris organises and runs the
ringing. We ring some simple 'methods' and some more ringing. We ring some simple methods and some more complicated ones as well. You will often find someone trying a new 'method' for the first time. Hurst is famous for its' cake break' at half time, this gives a chance for the young ringers to catch up with each other and other ringers. Alex (15) says: "I really enjoy the social aspect and the people I meet through ringing."





Where has ringing taken them?

Rachel (16), another Hurstpierpoint young ringer, conducted the Sussex Youth Team at the ringing World National Youth Contest in Birmingham last year. Josh and William were also in this team. We competed against teams from all over the country and came third overall. We often go on ringing outings together, visiting places like Portsmouth, London and Oxford. Rachel and Josh recently travelled to Bristol after being offered the opportunity to ring on the Grand Ring of 12 at St Mary Redcliffe. Rachel said: "The places ringing takes you is

extraordinary, but it all started for me in Hurstpierpoint. Recently we have started ringing quarter peals together. A quarter peal is 1,260 changes rung without a break and usually takes around 45 minutes (but we like to 'get them round' in 40!). They are great fun and require focus (one of our number, who shall be nameless, often has to be reminded to 'dodge', which is a change of a bell's 'coursing' position, in a method). A whole band of young ringers ringing a quarter peal isn't that common, and our performances don't go unnoticed across Sussex.

Telecoms Equipment Guidance

Following the <u>announcement by the Church of England</u> that they have signed an accord with the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS), setting out how churches and other church properties could host new digital infrastructure, the CCCBR Towers & Belfries Committee have prepared some guidance on this to assist any ringers that may have to deal with telecoms equipment being installed in their tower.

If you are being approached by telecoms companies at your tower, or your church PCC has been looking into it; do take into consideration that workmen/women will require access to the tower at any moment in time. Also the equipment listed in the CC document does take up considerable space.

To commemorate the 1400 bell ringers who died in the First World War, the Central






Council of Church Bell Ringers, together with the Big Ideas Company, and the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government, have launched a new campaign to recruit 1400 new bell ringers. This is a call out to all of us and an opportunity for everyone, a chance to make this wonderful ancient tradition open to all.
