CCCBR UPDATE

This year the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers meeting was held in Lancaster, at the University, on its traditional late May bank holiday weekend. After the vote last year to go ahead with a comprehensive restructuring exercise this was the time to vote on the proposed changes. A new set of rules and supporting structure.

In accordance with changes already put in place the format of the meeting was different; out went peals and ringing for those representatives attending and in came a series of seminars aimed at ringers from the local area, everyone was welcome. The seminars covered a wide selection of subjects and all seemed to be well received.

Some items had been retained including the official reception this year held in the Great Hall of Lancaster University on Sunday evening; again a break with tradition, there were no local dignitaries invited.

The actual meeting was split in two with routine matters being dealt with on Sunday afternoon. Also the Annual Meeting of the Ringing World Ltd was held prior to this starting. The main session was still on Bank Holiday Monday but commenced with adoption of the accounts. The next item was to discuss a new set of rules to support the proposed new structure. There were those in favour of retaining the status quo, others who wanted to see the vote on change held over for a further twelve months. As it turned out however the vast majority wanted to see the changes implemented straight away.

Last year we voted on whether to accept the changes that had been put forward; although they only required a straight majority there was overwhelming support for them. This year because it was a rule change a majority of two thirds of those present would be required, as it turned out over 85% supported the new rules.



This has brought in an executive of eight, including four elected people (one of them Alison Everett from Bosham) in addition to the four officers. Committees have been replaced by a smaller number of workgroups. Anyone can join a workgroup, not just elected Central Council representative members and it is hoped that this will introduce some new blood with different ideas as to how to deliver services to grass roots ringers more effectively.

For the 2019 there will be another significant change in that the AGM will move from May to the first weekend in September. It will be held in London and again there will be a number of seminars and presentations on a wide range of subjects aimed at all ringers. In the future there is more work to be done on developing a direct membership channel and the size of the CCCBR.

We are fortunate to have been sent two complementary articles about West's Striking Competition. If you just want to know the score then read the short; but if you want to watch the game then read the long!

A request had been received to hold a striking competition this year after an absence of a few years in the west.

The date selected was Saturday, 14th April and the venue at Walberton. This turned out to be a good choice as we were blessed with sunny, warm weather. The judge, Richard Verrall, from West Grinstead was recruited and he was accompanied by Sheila, his wife; always good news as she brought some of her wonderful bread pudding.

The afternoon combined the method and call change sections, with two in the former category competing for the Robert Wake shield and five in the latter. After a manipulated draw - Goring wanted to ring early in order to watch the Grand National and Steyning wanting to ring late due to a wedding at their home tower - all was under way. Richard was positioned in a sunny part of the churchyard to listen and ultimately give us his comments on our efforts.



The teams entering the call change section in some cases were made up of ringers from more than one tower all of whom attended practices together. The tower teams were Goring, Milland, Steyning, Walberton and Washington. Richard didn't give each team a score but placed them in the order for the best piece of ringing produced. After some words of wisdom he declared Walberton to be the winners.

Of the two teams in the method section one represented Chichester Cathedral and the other was a more 'put together' one. As it turned out they were awarded first place with Chichester Cathedral being judged runners up.

With between thirty and forty present it was a very enjoyable afternoon and a worthwhile event to be included in the District calendar.

the long

It has been some three years since the last striking competition and it is remarkable how quickly some people seem to find some other reason not to be available when prompted to join a band! Some had already arranged an outing of course, such as Felpham/Pagham and the Westbourne Deanery outing involving other local towers, and we are now getting into the wedding season, but we were able to organise five teams for change ringing and one for the method competition.(this was supplemented by a quickly formed 6 calling themselves "The Oldies").

Walberton church of St Marys was a good choice and 20 to 30 ringers gradually assembled while Moya sorted out the ringing order. A large gazebo was erected in the field about 100 yards away for our honoured judge, Richard Verrall, to sit in glorious isolation. The weather was perfect with an afternoon of balmy sunshine which we had so long hoped for, calming those nerves while waiting for the fatal call to ring! The birds were singing, spring flowers in bloom and a great tea was waiting for us.

Chichester Cathedral band rang first as they were the only entrant at the time for the method test and they gave us 240 changes of Bob Minor after a warm-up, even though the competition had called for only 120 changes! An ambitious choice with the slight odd struck nature of the 5 bell, but as there was no opposition, they were able to enjoy themselves.

The striking competition started with the Washington band, glad to get their ring out of the way. It was the first time some of the ringers had rung these bells so the warm-up for two minutes allowed, was important. A cautious ring then followed and their 6 minutes of changes were soon completed and the nerves eased as they made way for the Goring band. For the warm-up they gave us plain hunting which must have confused the judge, but the call changes followed after four strikes on the treble.

The local band from Walberton came next and they had no excuses for not knowing these bells! It was good to see a band from Milland to follow, as they have problems getting ringers together not only at their own tower, but helping out at a couple of others locally as well.

Steyning had entered a team but we had to await their arrival as they had a wedding to ring for earlier, so a scratch method band was organised to give the Cathedral a run for the money! Their 240 of Grandsire Doubles was a pleasant change to all of the callings and then we were able to enjoy the ringing of the Steyning band (already warmed up by their wedding bells!). While all us this activity was going on we enjoyed munching our way through a great spread of sandwiches, cakes, drinks and other delights set out in the little side room, and tried to stop Bella, Barry's cheeky spaniel, from snaffling the spare cake. We all eyed the raffle prizes while Moya sorted out the tickets and Dylan, Marjorie's little grandson, was very well behaved, even when tempted by the sight of all of that chocolate delight!

Richard in his gazebo had the task of working out the results and some suitable words to encourage our contenders. He emphasised the importance of good changing for everyone to achieve. Listening and counting with a handstroke leading gap were the key and well rung accurate striking, he said, will always be appreciated. The minimum of effort should be employed to produce the maximum effect and is achieved when the ringer has the best control of their bell.

He gave the results in reverse order with the eventual winners of the call change competition being Walberton, who rightly should know their own bells (even though half of the band were from Lyminster, they do ring regularly at Walberton). The



method ringing was won by "The Oldies" (a doubles method proving to be a safer choice than minor).

Graham called the raffle winners, the remains of the tea were distributed, and we all went outside with our shiny trophy for the winners photos taken by Kathy for "The Soundbow". It was agreed that it was good to bring back the striking competition again and even though it would have been nice to see more teams, the combining with the method competition worked out about right for an afternoon.

Well done to the Walberton band of Colin, Sue, Anna, Tony, Sue and David and to all of our other nervous competitors. Many thanks to Richard our judge for his kind words and patience, for Moya who had to call the Goring band changes as well as organise the event, and to Sue, Colin, Sheila, Marjorie and Anna for the super tea!

Findon needs a new clapper! - Michael Nott

An article on clappering and bells that go up "wrong" by Geoff Rix appeared in 'Sally Forth' in 2014 (ref 1) which means that when raised and set, the clapper is on the wrong side of the soundbow. More recently, 'The Ringing World' for December 2017 quoted an author of one of the first papers on clappering, F.H. King, that the usual trouble with bells that are hard to get up right is that the clapper swings too quickly in relation to the swing-time of the bell (ref 2). Two of the six bells at Findon, the 3 and the 5, are known to be difficult to raise correctly and the 3 is especially troublesome and will always go up "wrong" when rung up by an inexperienced ringer. The tenor and treble at Angmering have also sometimes been found to be up "wrong". We set out to compare the 3 particularly and the 5 at Findon with other bells to determine if there were any noticeable differences and, if so, whether anything could be done about it. This was helped with publication of the manual on belfry maintenance (ref 3).

The measurements required were the times of the swing of the bell and of the clapper, treating each as a simple pendulum, and the distance between their respective axes of rotation. Twenty-six bells were measured in four towers, Findon (F), West Tarring (T), Arundel (-) and Angmering (A). The weight of the bells ranged from 191 to 700kg. The time of swing of the clapper (Tc) and bell (Tb) was measured by taking an average of 10 or 20 full swing times, in seconds. The distance between their respective pivot points (from the centre of the gudgeons and clapper pivot pins), the "throw" (r), was found by measuring both to the belfry floor in centimetres and taking the difference. No fittings were altered and so the findings are not exact but are believed to be a close approximation.

The clapper time as a percentage of the bell time, or clapper/bell ratio Tc/Tb, for all 26 bells is shown in Fig 1. There is a spread of results and three-quarters, 75%, of the bells lie within the range 88 - 91% indicated by the broken lines. These would appear to be the "normal" limits and are consistent with the manual on belfry maintenance which states that the period of the swing of the clapper needs to be 90% of the period for the bell, much less and there will be problems in raising the bell correctly (ref 3). All bells known to go up wrong have results which are 88% or less, and these are A1, A6, F5 and F3. Notably, the finding of 82.4% for F3 stands out as lower than any other in the survey. Two bells at Tarring, the treble T1 and T5, are also shown. These were found to have values below 88% and yet are not known to go up wrong. All the bells at Arundel go up correctly. Measurements of throw were from 7.5 - 16.5cm and no correlation with any of the other measurements was found.



Things can be more complicated. The swinging bell is a compound pendulum. In an exhaustive paper (ref 4) King, McClenahan and Threlfall published a graph which purported to show how a bell would behave and this was used in both referenced articles (refs 1 & 2). It demonstrates the theoretical relationship between "pendulum equivalent length" of the clapper (Lc) and the bell (Lb), and the distance (r) between their axes of rotation (ref 4). The pendulum equivalent length is the length of a theoretical pendulum having a weightless shaft and same weight as the real one. This is obtained from the swing-time by squaring the measurement and applying a conversion factor (m) that includes acceleration due to gravity, which in this case equals 24.85. The formula for L is T² x m, where m = g/(4 π^2). This gives values for the clapper (Lc) and for the bell (Lb). We have superimposed values of A (r/Lc) and B (Lb/Lc) for our 26 bells on this graph, Fig 2. All the bells are clustered in a group in the zone where they may go up right or wrong. The 22 bells that always go up right are here. The six of special interest are labelled and can be seen to be spread inconsistently across the group, including

Findon 3 which almost always goes up wrongly. There appears to be no association with their true behaviour. The predictive value of this graph may be limited because the relationship shown, A/B, cancels out Lc, the term for clapper equivalent length; it is not easy to see what might be done to correct a difficult bell.

There are a number of reasons why bells may go up wrongly, for instance being odd-struck as is the 3 at Findon, having a long or loose clapper bolt, loose frame or fittings, worn fittings and perhaps worn, dry or damaged bearings. The specific need is to slow down the clapper swing-time, to bring it to the correct period of swing for the bell, in effect making it into a "longer" pendulum. It is impractical to extend a clapper but one with a thinner, or wooden, stem might have the same result by moving the centre of gravity away from the pivot. An alternative simple solution would appear to be to increase its weight. In the absence of other changes, what increase would be required to bring the clapper/bell ratio of F3 close to the normal range? Calculations indicate that to raise Tc/Tb to 88%, its clapper would need to be heavier by approximately 14%.

Findon bells F3 and F5 have fabricated steel canon-retaining headstocks, unlike the four other bells in the tower. It is proposed to replace these with lighter modern fittings, which are not so top-heavy, while retaining the existing clappers. Changing a headstock alone may improve things where the discrepancy is small but if the ratio Tc/Tb is significantly below "normal", as with F3, the headstock is unlikely to be the sole cause of the difficulty. Attention to necessary maintenance together with new headstocks and correcting the striking can be expected to improve things. Nevertheless, we believe we have shown, at least for F3, that it is the existing clapper which makes it so hard to ring up.

After this was written, the treble at Findon was found for the first time to have gone up wrong; Tc/Tb for this bell measures 88.3%.

Worshipful Company of Founders Visit to Arundel

Leaving St Nicholas' Church one Sunday after service, I was drawn aside by John Barkshire who is a distinguished welcoming steward." We are going to have a visit by The Worshipful Company of Founders on 9th May" he told me, so would you like to help out and give a little talk about the bells?

A search on the web told me that the Company were one of the oldest Livery Companies of the City of London and can trace back their existence to 1365! That was just after The Black Death and just before St Nicholas' and the adjacent Priory were built about 1380. It was one of the early medieval Guilds formed to protect the interests of members and to ensure high standards of workmanship and quality in articles of bronze and brass. It maintains its physical presence in the City of London through the Founders Hall in Cloth Fair. They promote research and education in related disciplines and in industry and offer bursaries for young sculptors working in bronze.

There was little to help me get an idea of the make-up of my audience for a talk and delving into the archives, I came up with a few facts about the bells.

History of the bells

- 1380 Church established
- 1455 3 bells chimed from floor level
- 1467-8 new bell added
- 1474-77 new floor inserted and 2 bells added to make 6 bells
- 1829 tenor cracked at funeral of Duke of York bells silent
- 1854 old tenor recast and ringing floor raised higher
- 1855 bells recast by C & G Mears of London and the 7 and 8 bells added. Bells are in a major key.
- 1855 peal of Grandsire Triples rung
- 1880 St Nicholas Bellringing Society formed
- 1885 Sussex County Association formed with Arundel a founder member

WW1 and WW2 the bells were silent and stored in the nave.

- 1950 Gillette and Johnson serviced the bells and had a steel frame installed
- 2015 major overhaul by Whitechapel Bell Foundry and frame painted by volunteers (in January!) after fundraising of £13,000-00 by local donations.

It is the honour of the current Master of the Company, Michael Harrison Swan, to choose an area for their 3 day outing and he had decided on West Sussex. A visit to Chichester Cathedral had been cancelled due to lack of time and the day of the visit was a warm one. Our visitors had been enjoying themselves touring Arundel Castle so they were 30 minutes late. Just as we were wondering if they had decided to skip the talk and go direct to the local vineyard where a generous lunch with wine awaited, the coachload of about 50 to 60 people arrived. They were not swathed in ermine and flowing robes as I had in the back of my mind, but a rather typical group of all ages on a summers outing.

John is a practiced guide for this type of gathering and I was a little alarmed at the mass of notes, the light pen and the mobile microphone system he carried, compared to the single page of brief notes which were my guidance.

After about 40 minutes of very interesting facts about the church (did you know that there were galleries to the sides of the nave in Victorian times and that up to 800 people filled the church?), I was called to give my little talk. It was clear that attentions were wandering by now, so my announcing that I would not speak for long but just give a few facts about the bells and then offer a tour of the ringing chamber, went down well.

I was not expecting such a good response to the last suggestion as many of the visitors were elderly and I did forewarn of a climb of 55 steps, but I can't remember so many in the tower before. Then I started to wonder what was the maximum number permitted (I had requested a maximum of 25 please). We must have had over 35, including two Italian tourists who joined in rather furtively, at the back of the queue.

The bells were down except for the tenor which I rang for them, then we moved up to the bell chamber, giving good access for visitors. This seemed to be the high-light of the visit for some who had never seen church bells up close. I was able to explain the workings and we had one or two bell-founders who were able to correct a couple of items in my talk!

All in all, it was a successful visit and a good public relations exercise, although I couldn't get a donation to repair our tower clock!

WESTBOURNE – 2017 HERITAGE OPEN DAY A GREAT SUCCESS

We opened our tower after the service on Sunday 10th September 2017 as part of the national Heritage Open Days.

We had about 60 people come up the tower which was open after the service from 10:30-12:00 to see the ringing and the bells. We had several of them "have-a-go" including many children.

We had 4 adults and 2 children sign up to come again on a practice night - one group, a family, joined us last night on our Monday practice. A Great Result with promise of more!!

A Template.....

I had created a web page on the HOD website. I had got the details printed in the Westbourne parish magazine and pew sheet. I had posters on the village noticeboards and in the neighbouring villages' boards, community centres, shops and libraries. I had also approached the parish/church offices of the local churches of all denominations with invitations to join us after their services too. Notifications were sent to the Portsmouth Evening News, The Chichester Observer and Radio Sussex. We had signs up outside the church to notify passers-by that the church was open

I borrowed the excellent model from Chichester Cathedral (Thank you Hamish McNaughton) so that we could talk through the mechanics of bell-ringing to those who weren't up the tower. And to reduce the time they needed to be up the tower for quicker turnover.

Geoff Anthony and Peter Wilkinson helped me set the back of the church up for the coffees and for the displays and the Bell Model. We also set up a laptop with a webcam in the Belfry using powerline network adapters to relay pictures of the bells to a laptop in the back of the church coupled to a widescreen TV. This all tested fine on the Saturday. The intention being that people would be able to see the bells all swinging.

Our band of ringers rang for the Sunday service and lowered and silenced 3 bells to enable people to "Have-a-go" yet still be able to demonstrate 5 bells ringing. They stayed for the service and were on hand to both demonstrate, guide the have-a-go and show them up to the belfry. All the time I was demonstrating the bell-handling and extolling the virtues of our hobby to the groups waiting down below.

We had some great feedback from the visitors who signed our visitors sheet and best of all we had a number who are interested enough to come again.
